### HURRICANE KNOWLEDGE

A hurricane is a storm with a violent wind, in particular a tropical cyclone in the Caribbean.

The Atlantic hurricane season runs from June 1st to November 30th.

#### **HURRICANE CATEGORIES**

Category 1	74 to 95 mph
Category 2	96 to 110 mph
Category 3	111 to 129 mph
Category 4	130 to 156 mph
Category 5	157 or higher mph

#### KNOW YOUR FACTS

The two following hurricanes are among the most devastating hurricanes of the world!

- Hurricane Andrew: Before Hurricane Katrina, Hurricane Andrew was
  considered to be the most damaging storm in the history of the United States.
  It caused a damage of about 26.5 billion dollars and had the monstrous
  winds with the speed of 167 miles per hour.
- **Hurricane Katrina**: Hurricane Katrina made a landfall on 29 August 2005 passing from the Caribbean and Florida. It was a Category Three Hurricane with a wind speed of 125 miles per hour. However, it was not as strong as the other destructive storms, it had been a Category Five hit, the day before it hit the land.

#### HOW TO STAY SAFE

- Safeguard important documents including an inventory of your possessions and insurance policies.
- Protect your propertyboard windows, remove dead trees and bring items indoors.
- Stock up on nonperishable items.

















- Follow the advice of local authorities.
- Do not go outside.
- When inside stay away from windows and find a safe area.
- If flooding threatens, turn off electricity at the main breaker.

- If you evacuated, return only after authorities say it is safe to do so.
- Do not walk/drive on flooded roads.
- Do not drink tap water unless authorities say it is safe.

## NATIONAL SAFETY MONTH- JUNE . SAFETY AT HOME

Home safety refers to the awareness and education of risks and potential dangers in and around a home which may cause bodily harm, injury, or even death to those residing in and around the physical structure of a home.

#### As you shelter in place at home with your family, check off these simple safety steps. Fire Safety: I have tested my smoke alarms and they are working. I stay in the kitchen while my food is cooking on the stovetop. I have a fire escape plan. CO Safety: I have tested my carbon monoxide alarms and **Home** they are working. Safe Pool Safely: I have checked the layers of protection around my pool/spa to make sure they are in good shape, including my for gate, fence, door alarm, pool cover or other layer. **Everyone** Medicines and Cleaning Products: My household cleaning products, laundry packets and medicines are in the original bottles, locked up and away from children. During these times of uncertainty, our home should be a safe place for us and our loved ones. Especially now, when we have to spend so much time indoors, we need to be able to identify and handle the hidden hazards in our home that can cause injury or death. Just as we are cautious with COVID-19, I urge you to protect yourselves and family from these hazards as well.

The above checklist provides simple and clear steps you and your family can take to ensure home safety.

## HOW TO PLAN A SERVICE PROJECT

- Identify the type of project you would like to execute.
- Make a list of items needed for the project.
- Select the location where you wish to conduct the project.
- Create a budget.
- Seek sponsorship and donations from Kiwanis family.
- Get the whole club on board.
- Create a planning team or committee



- Inform the relevant authorities via email, call or WhatsApp message. Begin promoting the project.
- Ensure that you have all resources for the project.
- Confirm attendance of members/other schools/Kiwanis family.
- Re-notify relevant authorities about the project.

#### After execution:

- Evaluate how the project unfolded, what went well, what went wrong, ways to improve.
- Reflect and discuss what you learned from the experience.

## HOW TO PLAN A SERVICE PROJECT





### Service projects

#### 1. Pecide who to help

Meet with your club and talk about it. Start with ideas that aren't too complicated, but will really make an impact. Think about your school. Do the grounds need to be cleaned up? Could your club plant flowers in a planter near the entrance? What about your hometown? Could you do a project at a nursing home or gather books for a family shelter?

#### Form a team

Figure out who from your club will work on the project. You'll need different people to do different things along the way.

#### Ask questions

Once you decide who to help, don't just guess what you need to do. Ask questions.

#### 4. Plan the project

Now figure out who's doing what, Write down a to-do list and assign different people different jobs. Give everyone a deadline.

#### Evaluate

After you finish the project, think about what went well and what didn't go well. Talk about what could go better next time.


